Interview

We had agreed with Chloé to visit the location in Simpelveld. We were invited to observe one of the Dutch lessons the residents receive there and we were able to have interviews with the residents. This could help us with our research to help them with a tool to learn more Dutch.

So beforehand we prepared interview questions to ask the residents and volunteers that give the lessons.

After the visit we got to know that the residents want to learn more Dutch language and culture. They think the one hour lesson to little. Also that a lot of people don't go because they only the basic and want to know more complex things. In the lessons they are mixed with others that are not so known with the language and some that already know a lot so then it's to easy for them. Pronunciation is one of the things they want to practice more, it's difficult to practice, because not many speak Dutch and another factor is that Simpelveld they have another accent. So these are the things we want to focus on.

Phone app

Making something for the pronunciation, that's what they found hard.

Different levels from easy to hard. Because some residents already know the basics and want to practice on a higher level.

they want sentences they use on a daily basis, for example when they go to a shop: "how much does this cost", or simple small talk you do every day like "how are you today", "nice weather today"

Some people are quickly demotivated.

Placing QR codes on different locations around the place, you can scan it with the app on the phone to learn the words. And then you hear the pronunciation.
